



Domestic Violence in Nebraska

WHAT IS DOMESTIC VIOLENCE?

Domestic violence is the willful intimidation, physical assault, battery, sexual assault, and/or other abusive behavior as part of a systematic pattern of power and control perpetrated by one intimate partner against another. It includes physical violence, sexual violence, threats, and emotional abuse. The frequency and severity of domestic violence can vary dramatically.

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE IN NEBRASKA

- In 2013, the National Domestic Violence Hotline documented 483 calls from Nebraska. The state ranks thirty-ninth in terms of Hotline call volume.ⁱ
- 173 domestic violence victims (94 children and 79 adults) found refuge in emergency shelters or transitional housing provided by Nebraska domestic violence programs on a single day in September 2014.ⁱⁱ
- In Nebraska on September 14, 2014, 228 adults and children received non-residential assistance and services, including counseling, legal advocacy, and children’s support groups.ⁱⁱⁱ

DID YOU KNOW?

- 1 in 3 women and 1 in 4 men have experienced some form of physical violence by an intimate partner.^{iv}
- On a typical day, domestic violence hotlines receive approximately 21,000 calls, approximately 15 calls every minute.^v
- Intimate partner violence accounts for 15% of all violent crime.^{vi}
- Having a gun in the home increases the risk of homicide by at least 500%.^{vii}
- 72% of all murder-suicides involved an intimate partner; 94% of the victims of these crimes are female.^{viii}
